# **The Assessment Task**

Write a critical review of Milton Friedman's essay 'The social responsibility of business is to increase its profits'

# Essay Word Limit - 2500 words (+/- 10%), excluding references

This is a widely cited piece, often used by advocates of corporate social responsibility to persuade us of the weakness / irresponsibility of the shareholder model of capitalism. It is advised that you read the original version of the Friedman text (see reading list for article details/reference).

- Showcase extensive comprehension of the range of businesses' responsibilities and the CSR imperative to create positive impact (social value)
- Evidence originality in the integration and application of appropriate models and techniques in analysing the responsibility of firms for their impact on society.
- Critically analyse and evaluate dilemmas faced by business organizations in confronting their corporate responsibilities.
- Articulating effective evidence-based arguments in writing

When you upload your work correctly to TURNITIN you will receive a receipt which is your record and proof of submission. If your assessment is not submitted to TURNITIN, rather than a receipt, you will see a green banner at the top of the screen that denotes successful submission.

N.B Work emailed directly to your tutor will not be marked.

### Late submission of work

For **first sits**, if an item of assessment is submitted late and an extension has not been granted, the following will apply:

- Within one week of the original deadline work will be marked and returned with full feedback and awarded a maximum bare pass grade.
- More than one week from original deadline grade achievable LG (L indicating late).

For **resits** there are no allowances for work submitted late and it will be treated as a non-submission.
